Let us remember that God's eternal love surrounds them.

We light this second candle to ask for deliverance from the pain of loss:

the loss of relationships—of jobs—of health—of security.

We ask God to place the gift of peace in our waiting hearts.

Refresh, restore, renew us, O God, and lead us into your future.

We light this third candle for each of us. We offer to God our pasts:

the times of regret and sorrow, the times of mourning, the difficult memories,

the times of grief and sadness and of loneliness and pain.

Let us remember that God's dawn defeats despair.

We light this fourth candle as a symbol of hope and promise.

We invite the coming of the One who brings us into new being.

Let us remember the one who shows the way and who goes with us into our tomorrows.

Look, the world is always ending somewhere.

Somewhere the sun has come crashing down.

Somewhere it has gone completely dark.
