An annual Lenten series exploring Christian Faith and Witness

Flesh & Fire: Reincarnation and Universal Salvation in the Early Church Sun., 3/10, 1-2:30 p.m., Church

Charles M. Stang, Professor of Early Christian Thought, Director of the Center for the Study of World Religions, Harvard Divinity School, will offer us an introduction to **Origen**—the first great Christian theologian. Origen's 3rd century writings, while declared heretical in the sixth century, are being reclaimed by a new generation of scholars within the Episcopal Church and beyond.

The Rise and Fall of Adam and Eve Sun., 3/17, 1-2:30 p.m., Church

Pulitzer Prize- and National Book Award- winning author of *The Swerve*, Harvard Professor **Stephen Greenblatt** will join us for an art-filled exploration of Adam and Eve, and examine the cultural and psychological power of the Genesis story.

"Forged in Crisis": The Life Lessons of Dietrich Bonhoeffer

How did faith and community sustain German pastor and theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer through years of persecution in Nazi Germany? What lessons does his witness offer us today? **Prof. Nancy Koehn** of Harvard Business School and author of *Forged in Crisis: The Power and Glory of Leading in Turbulent Times*, will offer us an overview of Bonhoeffer's life and the difference he has made in the seven decades since his execution.
