

Children and Youth At Trinity

At Trinity Church Boston, we delight in the presence of children and youth. Children's Ministry is a very big part of what we do. Based on our belief that children are vital members of our community, we include and incorporate children into as many of our special events and services as possible. Their insights



and fresh perspectives on Scripture and worship enrich and surprise us. Their sense of wonder delights us. Their searching and sincerity sustain us. From infants to high school youth, Trinity Church Boston thrives and grows because of the contributions and participation of our youngest members.

Children In Worship

We hope you and your children will sit within the best view of the altar. We also hope that you feel free to encourage your children's curiosity and questions during worship rather than quiet them. We believe that worshiping together as a family is one of the strongest vehicles for Christian formation. It is our desire that children feel as welcome and wanted as adults. To encourage this feeling of belonging, we provide children's bulletins and crayons in the Narthex and in the Clarendon Street vestibule.

To enhance everyone's participation on Sunday mornings, we invite children in K-5th grade to depart before the sermon at the mid-morning service for the Children's Homily and rejoin their families at the Passing of the Peace for the completion of the service. Four-year-olds with attention spans that allow them to participate for 20 minutes are welcome to attend as well.

The Trinity Choristers, made up of boys and girls aged 8 to 18, sing each week for the Sunday mid-morning service, and Wednesday Choral Evensong at 5:45 pm.

Nursery: Infants & Toddlers

Our Church Nursery—available for infants and toddlers up through age four—provides parents the opportunity to worship and attend adult education forums and classes knowing that their young children are in a safe and nurturing place. The Nursery is open Sunday mornings 8:30 am –12:30 pm. No reservations are required for Sunday mornings.

The Nursery is also open for certain special events, such as the Christmas Eve Children's Pageant, as announced. Please note that there are a minimum of six adult caregivers in the nursery at all times. Only deeply experienced caregivers, all of whom have received CPR training as well as the child protection training required by the Episcopal Diocese of Massachusetts, serve in our Nursery.

Children's Church School

In Church School, children learn about the Bible and the life of Jesus, as well as how to give and receive the blessings of being in community. Your children's special abilities to transmit God's love and grace are nurtured and supported, making our environment fertile ground for the growth of their gifts as they participate in our parish life.

Our Church School offers ageappropriate classes and activities for three-year-olds through children in

the 5th grade. Trained parishioners act as teachers and mentors. All classes meet in the Parish House on Sunday mornings, September through May, at 11:15 am, during the adult forum or education hour.

Youth At Trinity

Trinity Church Boston's Youth Ministry—designed for young people in grades 6-12—is grounded in the conviction that faith happens in and through community. We nurture a climate where young people are integrated into the life of the church and empowered to embody the extravagant love of God. We do this by recognizing and amplifying the life-giving talents young people have to offer the Church. We think that an open mind and a healthy skepticism are essential elements of the Christian faith, and that spiritual development is more a process of cultivating a relationship with God than accepting a set of specific beliefs. Youth Ministries at Trinity Church Boston are LGBTQ affirming.

Youth in grades 6-12 are invited to participate in the Middle School (grades 6-8) and High School (grades 9-12) Forums, which meet at 11:15 am on Sundays throughout the program year to explore urgent and timeless aspects of Christian faith through discussion and lively activity. Our middle and high school youth also gather throughout the year for fun and fellowship: cooking and sharing meals, going on retreats, and growing in Christian community together.





WORD OF GOD

First Reading Isaiah 9:2, 6-7 • The Prophet foretells the birth of Christ

The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; a light has dawned on those living in the land of the shadow of death. For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and he will be our ruler. And he will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. His power will never end, and his peace will last forever. He will rule David's kingdom and make it grow strong. He will rule with honesty and justice forever. The power of the Lord Almighty will accomplish this.

The pageant welcomes all children present who wish to participate. At specific times, children will be invited to come forward, receive a prop, and take their place at the manger scene. The littlest ones must be accompanied by parents.

The congregation remains seated for the entire pageant, including hymns, cards, and readings. We invite small children to stand so they can see.

Hymn 79 'O little town of Bethlehem'

O little town of Bethlehem, how still we see thee lie! Above thy deep and dreamless sleep the silent stars go by; yet in thy dark streets shineth the everlasting Light; the hopes and fears of all the years are met in thee tonight.

For Christ is born of Mary; and gathered all above, while mortals sleep, the angels keep their watch of wondering love. O morning stars, together proclaim the holy birth! and praises sing to God the King, and peace to all the earth.

Second Reading Luke 1:26–33, 38 • The appearance of the Angel

God sent the angel Gabriel to the village of Nazareth in Galilee. Gabriel spoke to a young woman engaged to be married to a man descended from the ruler, David. His name was Joseph, and the girl's name was Mary. Gabriel said to her, "Greetings, favored one! God be with you!" But Mary was frightened, wondering what was behind a greeting like that. But the angel assured her, "Mary, you have nothing to fear. God has a surprise for you. You will become pregnant and give birth to a son and call his name Jesus. He will be great and be called 'Son of the Highest'. The Lord God will give him the throne of David and he will rule Jacob's house forever and there will be no end to his kingdom." Mary listened to everything the angel told her and she said, "Yes, I see it all now. I am the Lord's servant. Let it be with me just as you say." And the angel left her.

During this hymn, stars proceed to the front.

Hymn 102 'Once in royal David's city'

Once in royal David's city stood a lowly cattle shed, where a mother laid her baby in a manger for his bed: Mary was that mother mild, Jesus Christ her little child.

He came down to earth from heaven, who is God and Lord of all, and his shelter was a stable, and his cradle was a stall; with the poor, the scorned, the lowly, lived on earth our Savior holy.

Not in that poor lowly stable, with the oxen standing round, we shall see him; but in heaven, where his saints his throne surround: Christ, revealed to faithful eye, set at God's right hand on high.

Third Reading Luke 2:1–7 • The decree of Augustus

In those days Emperor Augustus gave orders for the names of all the people to be listed in record books. These first records were made when Quirinius was governor of Syria. Everyone had to go to their own hometown to be listed. So Joseph had to leave Nazareth in Galilee and go to Bethlehem in Judea. Long ago Bethlehem had been King David's hometown, and Joseph went there because he was from David's family. Mary was engaged to Joseph and traveled with him to Bethlehem. She was soon going to have a baby, and while they were there, she gave birth to her first-born son. She wrapped him in strips of cloth and laid him on a bed of hay, because there was no room for them in the inn.

Hymn 101 'Away in a manger'

Away in a manger, no crib for his bed, the little Lord Jesus laid down his sweet head. The stars in the bright sky looked down where he lay, the little Lord Jesus asleep on the hay.

The cattle are lowing, the baby awakes, but little Lord Jesus no crying he makes. I love thee, Lord Jesus! Look down from the sky, and stay by my side until morning is nigh.

Be near me, Lord Jesus; I ask thee to stay close by me for ever, and love me I pray. Bless all the dear children in thy tender care, and fit us for heaven to live with thee there.

Fourth Reading Luke 2:8-14 • The Angels announce Jesus' birth

That night in the fields near Bethlehem some shepherds were guarding their sheep. All at once an angel came down to them from the Lord, and the brightness of the Lord's glory flashed around them. The shepherds were terrified. But the angel said, "Don't be afraid! for see—I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger." Suddenly many other angels came down from heaven and joined in praising God. They said, "Glory to God in the highest! And peace on earth to those God has favored!"

Hymn 109 'The first Nowell'

The first Nowell the angel did say was to certain poor shepherds in fields as they lay; in fields as they lay, keeping their sheep, on a cold winter's night that was so deep.

Refrain

Nowell, Nowell, Nowell, born is the King of Israel.

They looked up and saw a star shining in the east beyond them far, and to the earth it gave great light, and so it continued both day and night.

Refrain

During this hymn, **shepherds** and **sheep** proceed to the front.

Fifth Reading Luke 2:15–18 • The Shepherds greet Jesus' birth

After the angels had left and gone back to heaven, the shepherds said to each other, "Let's go to Bethlehem and see what the Lord has told us about." They hurried off and found Mary and Joseph, and they saw the baby lying on a bed of hay. When the shepherds saw Jesus, they told his parents what the angel had said about him. Everyone listened and were surprised.

During this hymn, **angels** and **all other children** come up to complete the nativity scene.

Hymn 96 'Angels we have heard on high'

Angels we have heard on high, singing sweetly through the night, and the mountains in reply echoing their brave delight.

Shepherds, why this jubilee? Why these songs of happy cheer? What great brightness did you see? What glad tidings did you hear? Refrain

Final Reading Luke 2:22-38 • Simeon and Anna thank God and share the story of God's Love

Mary and Joseph brought the baby Jesus to Jerusalem so that they could offer special thanks to God for his birth. When they arrived at the temple, a man named Simeon met them there. Simeon was righteous, faithful, and patient, and the Holy Spirit rested on him. God had promised Simeon that he would see the Lord's Messiah before he died, and, guided by the Spirit, he greeted Mary and Joseph. Simeon believed Jesus fulfilled God's promise to him, and he received the baby into his arms and praised God, saying, "Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace, just as you promised, for my eyes have seen your salvation, a sign of your love and a light for all people." And Mary and Joseph were amazed by what Simeon said about their son.

A prophet named Anna, who was the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher, also greeted Mary and Joseph. She was very old, and, like Simeon, very faithful. Anna never left the temple, and, night and day, she worshipped there with fasting and prayer. As Simeon blessed the young parents, Anna, too, began to praise God and to speak about Jesus to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem.

Trinity Church and The Episcopal Diocese of Massachusetts welcome all to Holy Communion. If instead of the sacrament in either kind you prefer to receive a blessing in the name of God, cross your arms over your chest. With that cue, a priest will offer a short prayer.

To receive the sacrament, come to the altar rail; stand or kneel (as you are able or as your piety prefers); and extend your hands, one inside the other. In turn, the priest will place a consecrated wafer in your open palm. If you require a gluten-free wafer, please request one from the priest offering Communion.

A Eucharistic Minister will follow with the wine; to receive, help guide the chalice to your lips. The server wipes the chalice's rim after every sip.

For those who find it easier to remain in their pew, please signal an Usher, and a priest will bring the sacrament to you.


