Note on Choral Masses

At the 9 am Holy Eucharist during the season of Epiphany, the Ordinary (*Gloria*, *Sanctus/Benedictus* and *Agnus Dei*) are sung by the choir. This venerable tradition is maintained and nurtured in Anglican cathedrals and certain parish churches around the world. The practice invites a different, perhaps deeper participation by the congregation. While the choir sings, the worshippers' meditation on the words and how the composer has expressed them can invite new ways of engaging these ancient texts. Musical settings include:

Harold Darke Communion Service in F (mid-20th c.) on Jan. 7 & 28;
Richard Webster's *Missa Dorica* (Mass in the Dorian Mode, 1996) on Jan. 14 & Feb. 4;
Philip Stopford's *Keble Missa Brevis* (1997) on Jan. 21;
and *Missa Brevis* of Benjamin Britten (1959) on Feb. 11.

Congregational singing of the Ordinary will resume during Lent, with Richard Proulx's *Missa Oecumenica*, an adaptation of music from the Russian liturgy.

A Jewish Take on Jesus: Talking the Gospels

“You have a beautiful faith,” says **Amy Jill Levine**. “But you don't need to make Judaism look bad in order to make Christianity look good.” A self-described “Yankee Jewish feminist who teaches in a predominantly Christian divinity school in the buckle of the Bible Belt,” Levine is the author of many books, including the bestselling *The Misunderstood Jew: The Church and the Scandal of the Jewish Jesus* and *The Meaning of the Bible: What the Jewish Scriptures and the Christian Old Testament Can Teach Us* (co-authored with Douglas Knight). She is also the editor of *The Jewish Annotated New Testament*.

In this session, Levine will help us to understand Jesus and in the context of Jewish identity in ancient Palestine, as well as examine “2,000 years of misconceptions between Christians and Jews.”
