



HISTORY

Come and See @Trinity

Thursdays & Fridays, 11 am - 3 pm, lower level of the Parish House

The murder of George Floyd brought renewed attention to the legacy of racism in this country, both that which we face today, and that which we inherit from our history.

We at Trinity Church in the City of Boston are choosing to explore our congregation's complicity in racism and



how we have benefitted, and continue to benefit, from the slave economy.

Located in the lower level of the Parish House, the "Come and See" exhibit uses words, images, and numbers to narrate the history of slavery and the slave economy in New England, highlighting connections to Trinity Church. Literally looking into this history is a wall of inspiring icons and artwork depicting the Black, Indigenous, and People of Color who are martyrs and heroes of our faith, from Hebrew Testament times, through the ministry of Jesus, and into our own day.








During this hymn, preschool and elementary-aged children will follow the three kings to meet members of our Children's Ministries staff beneath the pulpit. From there, all those gathered will travel to the Forum for the Children's Homily, an age-appropriate reflection on the Gospel reading.

Our Director of Children's Ministries, Cathy Portlock Pacitto, will then lead the children's return to the sanctuary during the Presentation Hymn.

We will sing the refrain only after verses 1 and 5. Stanzas 2-4 will be sung by soloists.

Gospel Matthew 2:1-12

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew. **Glory to you, Lord Christ.**

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet:

`And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel.'"

Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage." When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

Lift up your hearts.


We lift them to the Lord.

The Gifts of God for the People of God.

As we continue our loving care of one another during the pandemic, we will offer Communion in only one kind (bread), as our diocesan guidelines prefer.

Following the words of Invitation – "The gifts of God, for the people of God" – the choir and clergy will process to the West Porch. Starting with the rearmost pews, worshipers will then make their way to the West Doors and receive Communion there. We invite all to consume the bread once they are fully outside.

To support your praying and singing (and because you will not return to your pew), please bring your Worship Booklet and personal items with you to the West Doors. Once all have received the Sacrament, the congregation will, as the weather allows, reassemble at the foot of the stairs into the Square. We will then offer the Post-Communion Prayer; pronounce the Blessing; sing the closing hymn; and announce the Dismissal.
