The Letter to the Ephesians was written as a source of encouragement to the church in Ephesus (Turkey). Paul (or a

writer using Paul's name and style) wrote to the nascent church regarding the potential for a unified community—that the divisions between Jew and Gentile were rendered irrelevant by the cross, offering a new beginning for both, shared equally. The first part of this letter proclaimed Jesus' identity and God's desire for a unified community, and the second half centers on shifting day to day practices in order to fulfill God's hope.





WORD OF GOD

Though the Presider's posture (standing, sitting, or kneeling) will cue many in the pews, we invite you to participate as you are able and as your piety prefers.

The service of Holy Eucharist begins on page 323 in the Book of Common Prayer (BCP).

Children's Gospel pages and crayons are available in baskets in both the Copley narthex and the Clarendon vestibule.

Kindly return crayons at the end of the service.

We will pray the Psalm responsively, by whole verse.

During this hymn at the 10 am service, preschool and elementary-aged children may meet members of our Children's Ministries staff under the pulpit to travel downstairs to the Chapel for an age-appropriate children's homily. The children return to the service during The Peace.



Invitation

The Gifts of God for the People of God.

Trinity Church and The Episcopal Diocese of Massachusetts welcome all to Holy Communion. If instead of the sacrament in either kind you prefer to receive a blessing in the name of God, cross your arms over your chest. With that cue, a priest will offer a short prayer.

To receive the sacrament, come to the altar rail; stand or kneel (as you are able or as your piety prefers); and extend your hands, one inside the other. In turn, the priest will place a consecrated wafer in your open palm. If you require a gluten-free wafer, please request one from the priest offering Communion.

A Eucharistic Minister will follow with the wine; to receive, help guide the chalice to your lips. The server wipes the chalice's rim after every sip.

For those who find it easier to remain in their pew, please signal an Usher, and a priest will bring the sacrament to you.



Postlude "XVI. Placare Christe Servulis" from *Le Tombeau de Titelouze*' Marcel Dupré (1886-1971)

Among some half dozen great requiems from Mozart to Benjamin Britten, this by the Parisian composer and organist Gabriel Fauré (1845-1924) is unusual for its distinctive tenderness, solace, and serenity, what he himself described as "a very human feeling of faith in eternal rest." So doubtful about his own religious beliefs that his son called him "a sceptic," he brought to the composition a most singular outlook: "My Requiem does not express the fear of death. Someone has even called it a lullaby of death. But it is thus that I see death: as a happy deliverance ... rather than as a painful experience. I have also instinctively sought to escape from what is thought right and proper, after all the years of accompanying burial services on the organ! I know it all by heart. I wanted to write something different."

And so foregoing the large-scale solemnity of Verdi or Brahms, Fauré embraced a subtler melodic style and more modest musical forces. Instead of the liturgical tradition of an extensive Dies Irae and Tuba Mirum demanding the full powers of chorus and orchestra, Fauré included two new sections—the soprano's lyrical Pie Jesu and the otherworldly transcendence of In Paradisum. These memorably gentle movements floating on treble voices underscore the entire work's prevailing mood of sublime humility and peace, as John Bawden suggests, what has "often been described, quite justly, as a Requiem without the Last Judgment." In Aaron Copland's words, one "cannot help but admire the transparent texture, the clarity of thought, the well-shaped proportions. Together they constitute a kind of Fauré magic that is difficult to analyze but lovely to hear."

In this particular moment of heartache at home and around the world we come together to love and grieve at the same time. We celebrate and mourn. We offer both our thanks and our deep loss to God.


